#### LETTERS FROM THE LIGHTHOUSE



#### UP PERISCOPE!

Year 6 have been using their knowledge of how light travels, to create their own periscopes using only cardboard and mirrors. A periscope works by using two mirrors to bounce light from one place to another. A typical periscope uses two mirrors placed at 45 degree angles to the direction a person wishes to see. The light bounces from one to the other and then out to the persons eye. Periscopes are extremely useful devices, especially on submarines. Clever Science!
