WE LOVE READING!








WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS! (A football report by Lara's dad)

"The Wray Common team played brilliantly at the Year 3/4 Girls District Schools Football Tournament this week! They won all six matches and kept a clean sheet throughout, winning the tournament in a nail-biting final match against Reigate Parish (2-0). Under Miss Williams' careful guidance, they played like an experienced team from their very first game which saw a comfortable 4-0 win over Furzefield, with Cleo scoring a hat-trick. A 7-0 victory over Meath Green followed, with Lara scoring 4 and Cleo the rest. The other games were tighter battles, but Wray Common kept their heads throughout. They played a positive, attacking game, passing the ball around the pitch well and always pressing forwards, whilst managing to keep a defensive presence, always in the right place when needed. Philippa, Caitlin, Phoebe and Amira shared the responsibilities of defence and did a great job. Our goalkeepers (Caitlin & Philippa) didn't have much to do thanks to the heroics up front, but when the opposition got the chance to shoot, our goalies were rock solid and didn't make a single

mistake. Midfield was where this tournament was won though, and Lexi and Cleo were dynamos, always tackling hard and winning the ball back at every opportunity. Even against the professional-looking giants of Reigate Parish, our team weren't afraid to get stuck in, with Lexi particularly showing tenacity, perseverance and grit. Some great battles were played out in midfield with Wray Common always coming out on top; regaining possession then firing the ball forward to Lara "Fox in the Box" who was always quick to pounce on the pass and loose off a quick shot. Cleo played a blinder running the right wing and scored several brilliant goals, often at critical moments. Overall it was a fantastic team performance and, when they lifted the trophy, the smiles on the girls' faces showed how very proud they were, and rightly so."

COLLABORATE Children learn to work together, build on what each other has said, work in pairs or groups to negotiate, compromise and develop ideas further. This helps them contribute in class more effectively.

ASK Children are taught to be curious and ask creative questions about what they are learning. This helps with their engagement in lessons and their understanding of key concepts.

PERSEVERE Children are committed to being successful learners and are able to find and try new strategies to solve problems. This helps them build their learning resilience.

THINK

Children develop their ability to make connections between learning, spot patterns and compare, contrast and evaluate their work. This helps them to consider the right course of action in any lesson.

Children are able to use and select strategies and resources appropriate to the context. This helps them become more independent and effective learners.

REFLECT Children can identify successes, act on feedback and develop their own goals and targets. This helps them to seek further challenges and become more successful learners.

EXPLOREChildren have opportunities to investigate, take risks and thrive on challenges. This helps them to become better solution seekers when faced with problems.

AMAZING WRITING

Here is a piece of brilliant writing from Lucas in 6E based on a personal recount from a WW2 soldier.

Motionless I waited, leaning back against a fallen tree. As quiet as a mouse, I waited. Gun clutched against my chest, I heard something. A rustle of leaves. A rustle of leaves like a fox running through the woods. Across the opening a glint of light caught my eye. Through the veil of mist, I could just about see an obscured figure, wearing the all too familiar uniform of a German soldier. Then something else caught my eye. Along the ribbon of moonlight, a German soldier was crawling through the blanket of snow, elbows ploughing their way through the soft, white snow. As a Luftwaffe whizzed overhead, I saw his fair-skinned face, blue eyes and combed blonde hair. It changed nothing. He was a German. Suddenly everything seemed to be alive. The trees gnarled fingers were twitching, the wind laughing in my ears. My eyes were darting left and right, my breaths became irregular deep breaths in and shallow pants out. I knew I would have to do it. That's when it happened. I ignored everything. The wind. The snow. The cold. The fear. Everything froze but me and him. When he was about a metre away from me, I bolted up right, gun loaded and screamed at him to surrender.

My heart was pounding, blood rushing though my veins. A wave of surprise hit me. The German soldier wasn't surrendering but pulling out his gun instead. I had no choice. My finger squeezed the trigger. What was a split second felt like an eternity. I watched the bullet.

MARVELLOUS ME

Marvellous Me are delighted to announce the launch of their revamped Parent app. This upgrade gives a 30-day News Centre (the number one feature parents have been asking for!) as well as fixing notification bugs and other improvements.

To benefit from this new upgrade, it is essential that you please follow the below:

- 1. Check your device is running the latest operating software.
- Update the MarvellousMe app via the App Store or Google Play.
 - To do this, type 'MarvellousMe' into the search bar, click on the 'MarvellousMe for Parents' icon and select 'update'.
 - Your phone may have already updated MarvellousMe automatically in which case it will just have an 'open'
- 3. Open the MarvellousMe Parent app then:
 - Tap 'Settings'
 - Togale the 'Get device notifications', then switch off and back on again. Even if it shows as 'On', you must switch it 'Off' and 'On' once. This step is particularly important to ensure you receive MarvellousMe notifications going forward and benefit from the upgrade.
